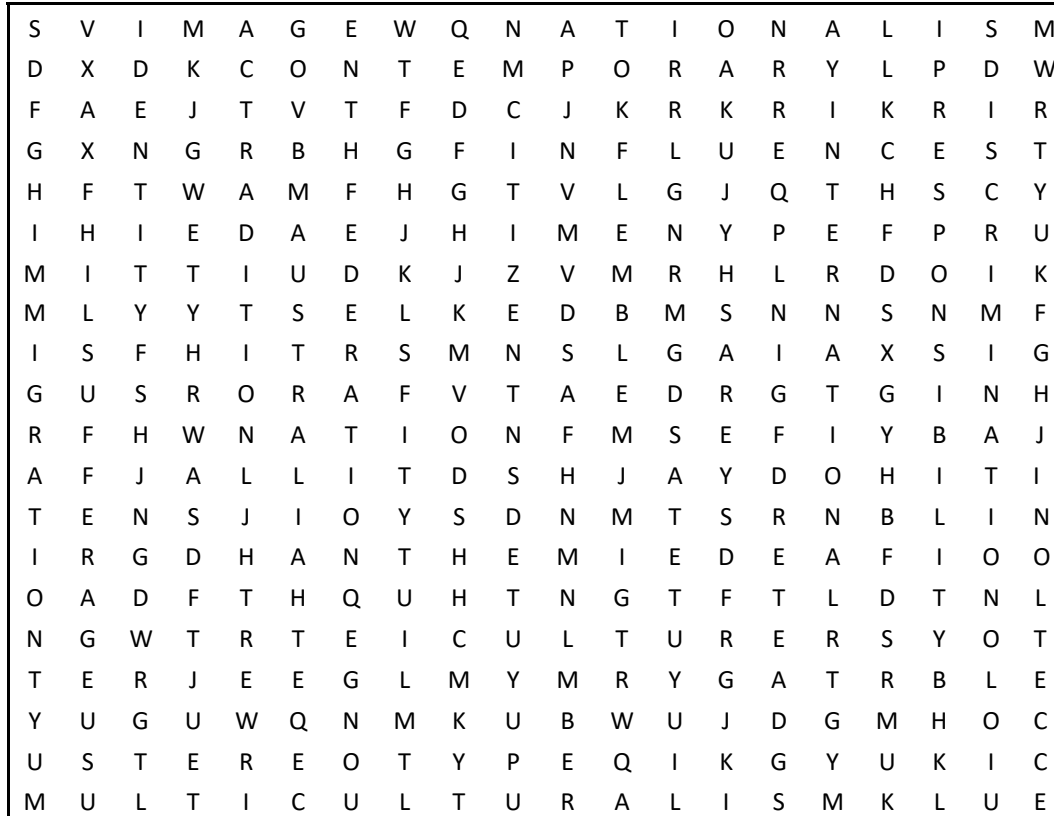

We are now going to explore the history of Patrick Augustine Kennedy who was an ANZAC.

On the 25th April 1915 Patrick landed at ANZAC Cove with the 1st Battalion. While he was there he was wounded 3 times. The first time occurred when he was returning to the ship, the second time he was hit in the shoulder while searching for Turkish sniper and the third time was during the Battle of Lone Pine when a bomb exploded in his trench.

Patrick sent some letters home to his mother while he was at Gallipoli. I'm going to give you one of Patrick's letters which he wrote after his second injury. The letter was published in a newspaper and we will read it as a group. Take note of what we are reading because you are going to have to answer some questions about Patrick's experiences.

NEWS FROM GALIPPOLI

A Cowra Boy Wounded Twice

The following letter has just come to hand from Private P.A. Kennedy, son of Mr. and Mrs. P Kennedy, of the Royal Hotel, who is at Gallipoli:-

4th May 1915

Dear Mother, - I am at hospital here for a few days to get over the effects of our recent engagement. We landed at Gallipoli Peninsula on Sunday, 25th April, and had a pretty hot time while landing. We had to get the infantry off first and drove the Turks back about three miles. Many casualties occurred in the landing as the Turks kept firing. Some blew up, a few being drowned. All this time the navy were putting their big guns to good work.

The Turks were very constant with shrapnel, which fell like rain all day. We were under a disadvantage at not having our artillery. The guns did not reach the shore till late in the afternoon. There was a great cheer as the first howitzer galloped up the beach with ten horses in hand. At this time I was wounded while going back to the ship. Before we left them there we were pleased to hear our artillery banging away.

The country where we landed was very rugged, but we drove the Turks over the first four ridges, though they were well entrenched, had big guns, and led by German officers. They were up to all sorts of tricks- laying mines, electric wires, pits, and so forth. A great impediment were the snipers, who popped our men off. It was almost impossible to see them, as they were covered with scrub. Some snipers had bushes tied around them; it was something new to see bushes walk! They acted cowardly, shooting many Red Cross men while attending the wounded. Another case was that of the two stretcher-bearers who were carrying a chap along and were cut down. Whenever our chaps found one they promptly bayoneted him.

The first party who landed, the 3rd Brigade, deserve great praise. They jumped from the boat into the water with fixed bayonets and chased the Turks over the hill.

We got a great reception at Malta. We are at Maletta and the people are treating us finely. We only arrived this morning.

I am doing OK, I got hit on the shoulder, but hope to be back in the Peninsula in a few days.
